Registering to enter Homecraft and receiving Exhibitor Tags

- 1. Entry Forms may be submitted by:
 - a. On-line, Complete Entry Forms at: www.brooklinspringfair.com
 - b. Mail Entry Forms to: Brooklin Spring Fair: Homecraft Entry Box 615 Brooklin, ON L1M 1B5
- All Entries received by online entry, drop-off, or postmarked no later than Wednesday, May 14,
 2025 will have their Exhibitor Tags mailed to them compliments of the Brooklin Spring Fair
- 3. The extended deadline is **Sunday, June 1, 2025**. Extended Entrants will receive tags when entries are delivered to the Fair (see #4 below). Tags must then be attached by the Entrant. No registrations will be accepted thereafter.

Dropping off your Entries at the Brooklin Spring Fair

- 4. Entries are to be delivered to the Luther Vipond Arena (67 Winchester Rd. E.) either on
 - a. Wednesday, June 4, 7:30 pm 8:30 pm and /or
 - b. Thursday, June 5, 8:00 am 11:00 am.

THE ARENA DOORS WILL BE CLOSED AND LOCKED AT 11:00 AM SHARP.

- 5. The Homecraft display area will be closed to the public on **Thursday, June 5** from **11:00** am **to 6:00** pm.
- 6. Entries will be on display from Thursday, June 5 at 6:00 pm until Sunday, June 8th at 5:00 pm.

Picking up your Entries after the Fair

- 7. Homecraft display area will be closed to the public on **Sunday, June 8th from 5:00 6:00 pm**.
- 8. While Homecraft is closed, exhibitors are asked to wait outside the exhibit area until display areas are made accessible.
- 9. Exhibits must be picked up on Sunday, June 8th between 6:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- 10. Claim numbers must be shown for release of exhibits.
- 11. Articles not claimed by 7:00 pm on **Sunday, June 8th** will be discarded. If you are unable to pick up your exhibits please arrange for someone else to pick up. Please provide them with your claim tags.

Homecraft General Rules

- 1. All entries may be submitted on the printed Entry Form provided in this prize list catalogue or in the format displayed on the website. Entry Forms can be photocopied if more space is required. Entry Forms must be dated and signed by the exhibitor.
- 2. Entry Tags must be AFFIXED to the article before drop-off by either tape or a pin unless otherwise noted in the Class rules. The Tag must be folded to conceal the exhibitor's name.
- 3. All work must be that of the exhibitor.
- 4. All exhibitors must be amateurs.

- 5. All exhibits must not have been previously shown at the Brooklin Spring Fair and will not be judged as a result.
- 6. No person shall enter more than one article per Section unless otherwise noted.
- 7. All entries must be suitable for a family-friendly setting.
- 8. Any questions pertaining to specific exhibits should be directed to the Class chairperson.
- 9. Items will be judged in accordance to the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) Judging Standards book or the Ontario Horticultural Judging Standards book.
- 10. Items entered will be judged at the Judge's discretion based on merit and Judges are not obligated to award a 1st prize in any Class.
- 11. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage to or accident to any person or property during the time of the Brooklin Spring Fair. Should any entry be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all the assistance in their power towards its recovery, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
- 12. All prize money is donated by the Brooklin Spring Fair Agricultural Society unless otherwise stated.
- 13. Exhibitors, in Classes where stated, with the most points in a Class will be awarded a prize of either money, a gift or a gift certificate. Points are awarded as follows:

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1st prize = 4 points
2nd prize = 3 points
3rd prize = 2 points
4th prize = 1 point

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Class 100 – Quilts and Quilting

General Class Rules:

- 1. Entries must be the work of the exhibitor within the last two years, clean and odour free.
- 2. Colour, design, binding and construction will be judged.
- 3. Articles to be exhibited are to be the work of amateurs only. We are defining an amateur as one who receives less than 25% of their income from the exhibited craft.
- 4. Machine quilting refers to longarm or domestic machines.
- 5. Hand quilting refers to any combination of hand and machine quilting. Not entries quilted by a group charging for the service.
- 6. In the group quilting category, enter under one exhibitor's name and indicate names of other group members on the back of the entry tag.
- 7. If using a commercial pattern, the name of the pattern designer must be included on the tag

OAAS Machine & Hand Quilted Competition Rules

- 1. The guilt must be solely made and guilted by the exhibitor.
- 2. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 823 cm (324 inches). Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 3. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- 4. The winning OAAS Machine & Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 5. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
- 6. For Machine Quilted entries, the use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.

- 4. Baby afghans must be a minimum of 61.0 cm x 91.4 cm (24" x 36")

490. Fleece Lap Blanket, by individual or group (group must be named)

Materials needed for Fleece Lap Blanket:

Two pieces of fleece (minimum width 88.9 cm (35") and minimum length 101.6 cm. '(40"), Creativity permitted. Kid-friendly patterns or colours preferred.

Directions

- 1. With right sides together, sew a 1.3 cm (1/2 ") seam along the long sides of the blanket. Leave top and bottom edges open.
- 2. Turn blanket right side out and lay flat.
- 3. Place a strip of masking tape across the width of the blanket 15.24 cm (6") from the top and bottom edges to form fringe. Make sure to cut both layers of fleece.
- 4. Carefully remove tape and knot the top and bottom fringes together to stabilize layers.
- 5. If needed, stitch a 25.4-38.1 cm (10-15") square in center of blanket to further stabilize the layers.

- 3. Entries must be covered with a CLEAR plastic bag or re-sealable bags.
- 4. Entry tag must be attached to outside bag on the non-open end.
- 5. No warm or hot food.
- 6. No mixes nor microwaving allowed.
- 7. All loaves must be cut vertically.
- 8. No pie (or tart, cookie, or cake) filling shall come from a can.
- 9. The Brooklin Spring Fair is not responsible for items consumed from the Culinary Arts Class.
- 10. Please follow specific instructions for each Section, if the Class Rules are not followed, the entry will not be judged.
- 11. No cannabis plants, products, or edibles may be entered in any category.

Blueberry Lemon Bundt Cake

- 2 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon all-purpose flour (for blueberries)
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup butter, room temperature
- 1 cup light brown sugar, packed
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups blueberries
- 2 tablespoons grated lemon zest

Lemon Glaze

2 lemons, juice of

2 -3 cups icing sugar

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In a bowl, whisk 2 1/2 cups flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.
- 3. In another mixing bowl, cream butter, and both sugars on high, until light and fluffy.
- 4. Add eggs, one at a time, beating until completely combined.
- 5. Beat in vanilla.
- 6. On low speed, alternate adding the flour mixture with the sour cream.
- 7. In a separate bowl, toss blueberries, zest and remaining flour.
- 8. Fold into batter.
- 9. Grease and flour a 12 cup bundt pan.
- 10. Spread batter into pan.
- 11. Bake cake on bottom rack of oven for 60-70 minutes.
- 12. Cool in pan for about 20 minutes, then invert onto rack. Cool completely.
- 13. For the glaze, combine the juice of two lemons with 2-3 cups of icing sugar, until desired consistency has been reached.
- 14. Drizzle glaze over cake.

- 3. Do not cover with plastic wrap.
- 4. Entry tag must be attached to the base board.
- 5. The Brooklin Spring Fair is not responsible for items consumed from the Culinary Arts Specials Class
- 6. Please follow specific instructions for each Section, if the Class Rules are not followed, the entry will not be judged.
- 7. No cannabis plants, products, or edibles may be entered in any category.

Decorated Cakes:

In addition to the General Class Rules above,

- 1. May use an artificial or Styrofoam cake base. The 'cake' does not need to be edible
- 2. Sections 701, 702, and 703 (Decorated Cakes) judged on decoration only

Pink Swiss Roll recipe

Sponge Cake 4 large eggs at room temperature ⅓ cup 135g granulated sugar ¼ teaspoon salt

1 cup 142g all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon baking powder

2 tablespoon 30ml milk

3 tablespoon 45ml sunflower oil (or olive oil or canola oil)

1 teaspoon 5ml apple cider or white vinegar

1 teaspoon 5ml pure vanilla extract

1-3 drops red food colouring (more or less for desired colour)

Buttercream Frosting

1 cup butter, slightly softened

2-3 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 pound powdered sugar (or 4 cups)

1-2 tablespoons milk (as needed)

Jam Layer

½ cup or as much desired for a thin layer over the cake

Icing Sugar for dusting finished cake

Directions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Lightly grease a 15x10-inch jelly roll pan and line it with parchment paper. You can also use a 17x11-inch baking sheet and the cake will be slightly thinner and bake faster.
- 2. Make the sponge batter. Place eggs in the bowl of a Place eggs in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment (or in a large bowl if using an electric hand mixer) and beat on high speed for 3 minutes until very frothy and doubled in volume. Add sugar one tablespoon at a time and beat for 5-8 minutes until pale, thick and tripled in volume. If you're using a hand mixer, it will certainly take 8 minutes on high speed, so don't under-whip it. The eggs should reach the "ribbon stage" where it can hold a figure "8" as it falls back onto itself when lifted with the beaters. Mix in salt.
- 3. Whisk together milk, oil, vinegar and vanilla in a small bowl and gradually pour it into the egg mixture while mixing gently on low speed.
- 4. Sift flour and baking powder into a medium bowl and whisk to blend evenly. Then, sift it again over the mixer bowl with the beaten eggs in two parts and mix it in gently on low speed until just incorporated, then finish mixing it in by hand using a large balloon whisk or wide spatula until evenly combined, scraping along the bottom of the bowl to evenly incorporate the ingredients.
- 5. Spread the batter evenly into prepared pan using a large offset spatula. Bake for 12-15 minutes if using a 10x15-inch jelly roll pan or 10-12 minutes if using a 11x17-inch sheet pan. Bake until lightly golden and it springs back when pressed gently. Do not over-bake or it will tend to crack since the surface will be dried out. Transfer pan to a wire rack to cool for a minute so it is easier to handle.
- 6. Meanwhile, lay a tea towel onto a work surface. Sift icing sugar generously over the warm cake to cover the surface. Run a knife along the edges of the pan to release the cake, then carefully but swiftly invert it onto a clean kitchen towel or another large piece of parchment paper. I find you'll have less chance of cracking if you use a kitchen towel. Gently peel off the top layer of parchment that the cake was baked in. Then, while the cake is still warm, gently

roll it into a reasonably tight log starting from the short side and incorporating the kitchen towel or parchment as you are rolling. Let the cake cool completely in this rolled shape with the seam side facing down.

- 7. Make the filling.
 - a. Add the "slightly softened" Butter (somewhere in between straight out of the refrigerator and room temperature) to the mixing bowl along with the Vanilla Extract.
 - b. Mix the Butter and Vanilla together until they are fully combined (about 2 minutes on medium speed.) You want the Vanilla to fully meld with the Butter to get the best-flavored frosting possible.
 - c. Scrape the sides of the bowl down before moving on to the next step of the recipe.
 - d. Measure 1 pound of Powdered Sugar. If you don't have a food scale, the equivalent is 4 cups.
 - e. Add the Powdered Sugar to the mixing bowl.
 - f. Start your mixer (or electric beater) on the lowest setting. Keep on low until the butter and sugar are incorporated (about 30 seconds). Stop the mixer and scrape down the sides of the bowl. Increase the mixer speed to medium-high and mix for 30-45 more seconds until the frosting starts to be light and fluffy.
 - g. If the frosting is still dry or crumbly, add 1 teaspoon of Milk and mix again.
 - h. Taste your frosting! You are trying to determine if the consistency is correct or if it needs a tiny bit more Vanilla Extract. Depending on how it tastes, you will take the next step. If the frosting has the right taste but is too thick, add some Milk and mix again to check to see if it is now the right consistency. How much milk? That depends on the state of your frosting. A good rule of thumb is to add the milk a teaspoon at a time.
- 8. Assemble the cake. Unroll the cooled cake and first spread the jam in a thin layer over the cake. Then, spread the buttercream filling over the surface leaving about ½-inch border. Use as much or as little filling as you see fit. Gently but fairly tightly roll up the cake with the filling. Transfer it to a serving plate or a another lined baking tray, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 2 hours to set. Dust with icing sugar before slicing.

- 1 ¾ cup all purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 ¾ cup quick cooking oats
- 34 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup M&Ms

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350F. Grease a 9 x 13 pan and set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar. Beat in peanut butter, eggs, and vanilla.
- 3. In a separate bowl, stir together flour, and baking soda. Add to large bowl and stir until combined. Add oats, chocolate chips and M&Ms.
- 4. Press into greased pan. Add additional M&Ms to the top, if desired, pressing them into the dough slightly.

Bake for 14-16 minutes or until edges are slightly brown or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Do not overbake. Let cool a bit before slicing. Letting them cool completely is best.

Potato Candy Recipe

½ cup (105g) mashed potatoes

½ cup (1 stick) salted butter, softened

6-7 cups (800-910g) powdered sugar, plus additional for dusting

2 tsp vanilla extract

Creamy peanut butter for filling

Directions:

1. Combine mashed potatoes, butter, and one cup of sugar in a large bowl and use an electric mixer to stir until combined.

- 2. Add remaining sugar, 1 cup at a time and stirring until combined after each addition. Once you've added 6 cups of powdered sugar, check the consistency. If the dough is not moldable in your hands and can't be rolled into a ball, continue to add sugar until it is firm.
- 3. Stir in vanilla extract.
- 4. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour (if you chill longer it may become too firm and brittle and will just need to sit at room temperature for 10-15 minutes until it is pliable).
- 5. Once chilled, divide dough into two pieces and place one piece on a clean surface that you've generously dusted with powdered sugar. Dust the surface of the dough with additional sugar, and use a rolling pin to roll dough out into a rectangle about ¼" thick. If your dough is too sticky or falling apart, you may need to add more sugar, re-shape it into a ball, and start over.
- 6. Once dough has been rolled into a 1/4 "thick rectangle, spread evenly with peanut butter, leaving a small amount of space peanut butter-free around the perimeter of the dough.
- 7. Starting with the longer side of your rectangle, gently but tightly roll into a log.
- 8. Use a knife to slice into pieces about 1/4-1/2" thick.
- 9. Repeat steps 5-8 with remaining half of dough.

- 2. Lay the fabric stripes on a flat surface in the shape of an "X" and place the tennis ball in the middle

- 4. Cut each fabric tail into three (3) strips, roughly two (2) inches wide. Be careful not to cut the fabric off of the toy!
- 5. Braid the fabric strips and tie the ends as tight as possible making sure there are no gaps between the braids. Tie knots at the end of the braid with excess fabric to secure the braids. The tighter everything is tied the more durable the toy will be
- 6. The dog toy is complete!

Material

- 3 pieces of Yarn
 - o 3-4 inches
 - o 60 inches (approx.)
 - **18-24 inches**
- Fork
- Scissors

Directions

- 1. Cut a piece of yarn about three (3) to four (4) inches long. Drape this piece at the base of the fork, between the middle two prongs, where the prongs meet the handle
- 2. Wrap a second piece of yarn about sixty (60) times around the prongs of the fork (the part that you eat with). The more you wrap the yarn around the fork, the puffier the pompon will be
- 3. Take the first piece of yarn and tie it around the yarn "ball" that you wrapped around the fork prongs. Make sure it is VERY tight, this string will keep the pompom together
- 4. Slide the yarn off the fork and cut the yarn at the sides to create a pompom. Trim if necessary
- 5. Attach a third piece of yarn (18-24 inches long) to the pompom so that it can be attached to a stick or doorknob
